The Night Sky is Wilderness

The Wilderness Center is proud to announce the launch of a new program called Community Conservation. At present this program consists of two initiatives, Backyard Habitat and Dark Sky Conservation, each focused on educating and supporting our community in making small changes at home to support a larger conservation effort.

Artificial light at night has revolutionized the way we live and work outdoors, but it has come at a steep price. Artificial lights are now overpowering the darkness; our cities and surrounding urban and industrial developments glow at night. Light can be a pollutant. When used indiscriminately, outdoor lighting can disrupt wildlife, impact human health, waste money and energy, contribute to climate change, and block our view of the universe.

It is estimated that half of all species on Earth start their daily activities at sundown. Animals and plants depend on Earth's daily cycle of light and dark. This rhythm governs all their life sustaining behaviors such as eating, sleeping, reproduction and protection from predators.

Artificial light at night is having negative and deadly effects on many creatures including birds, mammals, amphibians, and insects. For instance, glare from artificial lights can impact wetland habitats that are home to amphibians such as frogs and toads. The nighttime croaking of these creatures is part of their breeding ritual. Artificial lights disrupt this activity, interfering with reproduction resulting in declining populations. Birds that migrate or hunt at night use moonlight and starlight to navigate. Artificial light at night is having a devastating effect on these birds. Every year the unnecessary light from brightly lit buildings and towers leads to the death of millions of birds by collision with these buildings. Migrating birds depend on seasonal cues to begin their migration. Artificial

lights can cause them to migrate too early or too late causing them to miss ideal climate conditions for nesting, foraging and other behaviors. In ecosystems everything is connected. Insects are at the heart of every food web.

Research is showing that insect populations around the world are declining and that artificial light at night is an important and often overlooked contributor to this decline. Artificial light at night also affects plants. Light at night can cause trees to miss the seasonal cues for their leaves to change color in the fall.

It is estimated that at least 30 percent of all outdoor lighting in the U.S is wasted, mostly by lights that aren't shielded. This waste adds up to \$3.3 billion and the release of 21 million tons of carbon dioxide per year. To offset this amount of carbon dioxide 875 million trees would need to be planted annually.

Studies have shown that 99% of the US population live under light polluted skies. Today, millions of people have never seen the Milky Way. The night sky is our heritage. It has inspired science, religion, philosophy, art, and literature. Experiencing the night sky provides perspective and inspiration and leads us to reflect on our humanity and our place in the universe.

Per the Skyglow Project, "Light Pollution, also known as Skyglow, may not appear to be the most urgent problem facing the planet, but it may be the most indicative of humanity's growing separation from nature."

TWC is uniquely situated to take on this initiative as it has a long history of conservation projects, and wildlife and astronomy education. It fits TWC's mission of conserving natural resources and practicing environmental stewardship. This initiative will make TWC a showcase for dark sky conservation efforts and will educate our community on how we can make a difference in combating light pollution and help return the dark of night to our wilderness and reclaim our extremely rich night sky heritage.

Light pollution is one problem the average citizen can do something about.
